2018 8th PreAP Summer Reading Assignment

These assignments are due the first day of school. Failure to do these assignments will result in a schedule change to an on-level class. You will have two books.

Read The Luster of Lost Things by Sophie Chen Keller. This book is readily available from the public library or local bookstores. I have two copies that I will check out; please return these the first day of school.

Assignments:

Answer the following questions and bring your paper the first day of school:

- 1. Ruby gives Walter the "first gift [he has] been given from someone who is not Lucy" (p. 275). What does Ruby show Walter about the world? How does her friendship change him? This answer should be at least a paragraph 5 or more sentences.
- 2. Write 1-2 paragraphs about a gift you received that changed you.
- 3. How does Walter's inability to speak shape his character? In what ways does his speech change throughout the book. This answer should be at least a paragraph 5 or more sentences.
- 4. Join the Google Classroom for this book b5wg2g. I will post a discussion question July 30th. You will need to post an answer to the question and post a response to another student's answer. Your response should be several sentences and should reflect either your agreement with their ideas or how you disagree with their ideas. Posts must be completed by August 17th.

This will be done in class:

5. One of the themes of this book is about kindness. Think about a kind thing you have done for someone else, or think about a kind thing that someone else has done for you. Think about how you can connect this with Walter's story. Be prepared to write 3-5 paragraphs about this in the first week of school.

Read a book of your choice. You may use your PreAP Science book for this assignment, or you may choose a book from the attached list.

For your choice book, you will have a choice to create either:

- a poster that includes the following elements, OR
- 2. A Powerpoint or Prezi presentation (on a flashdrive) that contains the following elements:
- A. A brief description of the two characters you believe are most important. Include a picture of something that you believe would symbolize each character.
- B. A timeline of major events of the book. Include at least 6 events including the climax and resolution. You will need to briefly describe the event; please do not just list.
- C. A picture, either hand-drawn or created on a computer, of a setting from the book. Explain where this setting falls within the plot line. Please do not use a picture from a movie or a picture you found on the internet; you should create this picture.
- D. Your review of the book. This must be in your own words. I do not want something from the book's cover or from a website. This should be at least a paragraph. At the end of the review, give the book a rating: 1-5 stars with 5 stars being the best.

- Must have three ideas submitted and one approved before the school year starts. When you have all three of your ideas, submit them through email at the following email address: madyson.lane@bushlandisd.net.
- 3. **Students must complete 2 of the following events during the school year.** (Students will have to commit to two events by the 3rd week of school and have their parents sign off on them.) *The participation for these events are limited because the number of teams allowed is limited.

 - Background information on topic/Include references
 - Your point of view with supporting details
 - Your review on the book and review on the article
 - Must be typed, single-spaced, 12 point font, with a title, and your first and last name
